




Allman and Andersen Victorious in Paris




Sunday, July 7th; Paris France – At the super-competitive Diamond League Meeting de Paris, the NYAC's Valarie Allman continued her season-long hot streak, taking the discus competition, while Brooke Andersen, an Olympic medal favorite before failing to make the team at the US Trials, returned to top form, claiming victory in the hammer throw. Chris Nilsen contested the pole vault but was unable to record a mark. Allman, the defending Olympic champion, won the discus with a mark of 68.07m/223-4, turning back the challenges of Jorinde van Klinken (NED, 67.23m/220-7) and Alida van Daalen (NED, 65.78m/215-10). So far this season, the NYAC woman has claimed Diamond League wins in Xiamen, China, Suzhou, China, Eugene, and now, Paris. The qualifying rounds for the Olympic discus competition begin

on Friday, August 2nd. Andersen, the 2022 world champion, won the Paris Diamond League hammer throw with a meet record of 73.27m/240-4, a bitter-sweet illustration of her capability had she made the Olympic team. Reportedly, Andersen has suffered with vertigo throughout the season. At the Trials, after winning the qualifying round, she was unable to land a legal mark in the final. Williams (decathlon). • The US Paralympic Track and Field Trials take place in Miramar, FL from Thursday, July 18th to Saturday, July 20th, with Mikey Brannigan and Hunter Woodhall vying for selection, and Tatyana McFadden seeking selection in the 100m, 400m, 1500m and 5000m, in addition to the marathon, for

Water Polo - US Women Go 1-1 Against Hungary

Friday, July 5th and Tuesday, July 9th; Berkeley, CA - In their last home game before heading to the Olympic Games, the US women faced a powerful Hungary team in California, a crucial match-up prior to the USA's quest to secure a fourth consecutive gold medal in Paris. In the first match on Friday, July 5th, the US scored a 12-8 victory, with three goals each from Rachel Fattal and Maddie Musselman, and 11 saves from Ashleigh Johnson. The second match, on Tuesday, July 9th, saw a reversal, with the Hungarians taking revenge, 10-8. Fattal, Musselman and Jewel Roemer scored twice each, but it was not enough to clinch the victory. Triathlon - Rappaport 13th in Hungary

Saturday, July 6th; Tiszaujvaros, Hungary – While the US water polo women were facing Hungary in California, the NYAC's Tokyo 2020 Olympian, Summer Rappaport, headed to Tiszaujvaros in Northern Hungary to contest the World Triathlon Cup. Rappaport's 5.16K run segment (16:53) was the third fastest of the day; but her 9:41 for the 750m swim and 32:37 for the 20K bike saw her place 13th with a cumulative time of 1:00:48. The victory went to Germany's Annika Koch in a time of 59:17. Click here for full results from Tiszaujvaros. Rappaport was not named to the US squad for the Olympic Games, but NYAC representation in Paris will be strong. All five of the men and women named to the US Triathlon Olympic team are members of the NYAC - Taylor Knibb, Taylor Spivey, Kirsten Kasper, Morgan Pearson, and Seth Rider.
