




Knibb Punches Second Ticket to Paris

The NYAC woman will undertake a unique double - Triathlon and Cycling

Wednesday, May 15th; Charleston, WV - This week, the NYAC's Taylor Knibb, already selected for the Paris 2024 Olympic triathlon, shocked the field at the <u>USA Cycling Pro Road Championships</u>, claiming her first time trial national title and her second spot at the Paris 2024 Games, this time in cycling. Knibb earned her place on the US tri team in August of last year, and will compete in the individual and mixed team relay competitions. Remarkably, just four days prior, Knibb had been in Yokohama, Japan to contest the WTCS Series, where she placed second (see report below). Clearly, that event and the subsequent travel impacted the NYAC woman's performance in West Virginia not at all. Angelina Palermo of USA Cycling reported: "This route was quite similar to the course the riders will be seeing in Paris – both virtually flat and roughly 33km. Knibb excelled....but not without some heavy competition behind her. 2024 La Vuelta Femenina stage winner Kristen Faulkner (Homer, Alaska; EF Education-Cannondale) kept pressing on. At the first split, Faulkner was only 0.2 seconds behind Knibb, holding on to her pace. She ultimately finished in second [in 42:05:88; Knibb's winning time was 41:54.69]. 49year-old Amber Neben (Lake Forest, Calif.) rounded out the podium in

third [in 42:44:53]." Knibb had also contested this race in 2023, placing fourth. The full results from Charleston are here. While it is commonplace for athletes to contest multiple events in the same sport at an Olympic Games, it is exceedingly rare for someone to earn selection for two different sports at the same Games. • Saturday, May 11th; Yokohama, Japan – As mentioned above, four days prior to stunning the field at the Pro Road cycling time trial in West Virginia, Knibb had been in Japan for the WTCS Series Yokohama triathlon. The NYAC's Morgan Pearson, like Knibb a Paris 2024 Olympian, also made the trip, and made it worthwhile by securing the victory and becoming the first American man to win a WTCS race since 2009. USA Triathlon reported: "Pearson completed the 1500m swim, 40K bike and 10K run in 1 hour, 42 minutes, 5 seconds, while running the field's fastest 10K in 29:11. He finished the swim among a group of 20 athletes, 13 seconds down from the leader. After a swift transition, Pearson settled into the



lead pack on the bike that eventually swelled to more than 50 athletes including all five U.S. athletes: Pearson, Matt McElroy (Huntington Beach, Calif.), Kevin McDowell (Geneva, III.), Darr Smith (Atlanta, Ga.) and Seth Rider (Germantown, Tenn.). The U.S. group avoided danger on the final lap of the bike that saw a crash and large pileup of more than 15 athletes who hit the pavement, including France's Dorian Coninx and Tom Richard, and Vasco Vilaca of Portugal. Pearson then overcame a slow biketo-run transition to methodically pick off runners one by one to make his way to the front by the second lap. Pearson commanded the front of the race, pushed by Australia's Matthew Hauser on the final lap, but a late surge by Pearson cemented the win for the former NCAA All-American runner." Other NYAC athletes also performed well in Yokohama. Vincent Luis was ninth (1:42:40), Matt McElroy 13th (1:43:13) and Kevin McDowell 47th (1:48:19). Taylor Knibb, as previously noted, placed a superb second (1:53:04) among the women before heading for the airport and a victory, four days later, in the Olympic trials for the US cycling time trial team. Leonie Periault from France was the women's winner in Yokohama in a time of 1:52:28. The NYAC's Taylor Spivey finished 4th

(1:53:25), **Kirsten Kasper**, 5th (1:53:34) and **Summer Rappaport**, 49th (2:00:50). **Click here** for full results. Notably, had Spivey been one place higher, she would have earned auto-selection for the Olympic Games. At the present time, therefore, Knibb and Pearson are the only athletes to have been named to the US triathlon team for Paris. In total, there are three male and three female spots to be filled, with Yokohama being the final opportunity for US triathletes to auto-qualify. Since no one made the cut, the remaining team spots will be decided by discretionary selection by an Olympic Games Athlete Selection Panel and announced in June.
